## IMPLEMENTING LOW-TECH RESTORATION

practices and techniques, such as beaver dam analogs (BDAs) and Zeedyk structures, can **increase forage productivity by up to 25 percent** and maintain green vegetation that persists even after wildfire.

"The more infiltration we get, the more my spring will flow down there into a pond that then irrigates the lower field. I could spend \$100,000 building a new dam, or the BDAs might just do it in a more natural way."
